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Kids' Lit Quiz 2017



On Thursday 9th November ten members of Year 8 and 9 travelled to Wellington College Belfast to take part in the international reading competition, the Kids' Lit Quiz.

Quizmaster Wayne Mills, from New Zealand, welcomed the 29 teams and then began the 10 rounds of 10 questions on subjects as varied as mythology and toys.

The Year 8 team took an early lead as they won the first round and were awarded with a bonus prize of some books!

The audience got a chance to participate in the competition too, and questions for book tokens were directed their way after every few rounds.

As the rounds progressed, the teams grappled with picture rounds, 'Who Said That?', and showed off their knowledge on witches, transport and war in children's books.

After the penultimate round the scores revealed that the Year 8 team had eased into joint second position. An incredibly tense tie-break ensued: but unfortunately the team were beaten to the answer.

However both teams acquitted themselves admirably and the final scores saw Year 8 in 3rd place with 70 points and Year 9 just 5 points behind in 12th place. The Prep team also performed well. A most enjoyable and rewarding day for all!

Author Visit - Brian Gallagher

On 26th September the Irish writer Brian Gallagher visited the school Assembly Hall to speak to Year 10 pupils about his work. *Arrivals* is his current title, having already published *Pawns*, *Stormclouds* and *Secrets and Shadows*, which are available in the Library. After reading some extracts, he explained his love of historical fiction and told listeners about his writing process: how he writes a CV for all characters to ensure detailed portraits as well as the lengthy process of redrafting before publication. This inter-



esting insight into historical novel writing ended with questions and answers as well as the opportunity to get books signed.

Royal Society Young People's Book Prize

The autumn term saw a small group of dedicated Year 8 and 9 students participate in the Royal Society's Young Person's Book Prize. This book club with a difference focused students on books not normally chosen for pleasure as well as incorporating science titles and a wide range of ideas and ages. The group met weekly in the



Library to discuss the six short-listed titles which included beautiful picture books for very young



scientists: 'This Little Pebble', 'If...' and 'A First Book of Animals' as well as informative titles for older readers: '100 Things to Know About Space', 'The Awesome Body Book' and the winner 'Home Lab'. This book by Professor Robert Winston, was full of exciting experiments for budding scientists and got our group's final vote as well. As well as discussing each book and deliberating its worthiness as a winner, the group submitted a short video to the competition of themselves at work. Although we didn't win it was fun to record our efforts!

The Northern Ireland Book Award

After a two year break the Northern Ireland Book Award is back and that means the opportunity for pupils to shadow the judging panel and select a winner. The shortlist was drawn up following a list of nominations from those with school library responsibility that met the following criteria:

- Published between January 2016 and June 2017
- Fiction for the children's or Young Adult market, with YA protagonists
- A debut author (or an established author writing for this audience for the first time)
- Written in English, or translated into English for the first time within the time period stated above.

The books have been selected to appeal to a wide range of pupils and age groups, and as such, two of the titles may be more suitable for those aged 13+. You do not need to read all of the titles to take part in the shadowing scheme and vote for a winner!

The Book Award Shadowing will run from January to April 2018. The first meeting of the Sullivan Upper Reading Group is Monday 22nd January in the Library at 1:20pm. All ages welcome to discuss titles and post reviews!
